For example, *ah* is the sound you make when the nurse puts a tongue depressor in your mouth. *Oh* is the sound you make when you start to sing the "Star Spangled Banner."

French Names & Terms

French (just a few of the many rules) Say é and er, es, et, ez at end of words as in day; also at at the end of a verb as in day. Say è as in pet. In short, one syllable words (je,te, de, etc.), say e as in nut. Say u and û as in few; ou as in food; eu and eau as in mow. Say i and y as in bee; a as in mad; of as in wash. Combinations ain, aim, eim, ein, in, im, ym, yn and ien all have a nasalized vowel sound as awⁿ; the n or m at the end of the word is not pronounced. Most consonants at the very end of a word are not pronounced. However, the consonants c,r,f,or I (careful) are often pronounced. In list below, a very small consonant indicates to just barefly pronunce it. Special characters: ã as in Sarah; au as in now; ei as in like; ie as in me; ch as in lock; ü as in cue. With ei and ie in German, always pronounce the second vowel.
